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HARC Completes Second Phase of Region-Wide Community Health Survey
Eagerly Awaited Community Health Monitor to Help Shape Future
of Care in Eastern Riverside County

(PALM DESERT, CA) – More than 3,100 residents living in cities ranging from

Calimesa to Blythe participated this year in the most comprehensive survey of

community health needs ever undertaken in the region. Results from just-completed

confidential interviews will be released this winter as part of a document called the

Community Health Monitor now being developed by the Palm Desert-based nonprofit

Health Assessment Resource Center (HARC).

The research initiative aims to deliver healthcare providers, cities, government

agencies, and private interests a snapshot of public health in eastern Riverside County.

HARC data will be used to facilitate decision-making on future issues such as program

development, access, funding, utilization, and more.

Respected health research firm Macro International canvassed more than 55,000

people through phone calls in the data-gathering phase. Respondents fielded questions

related to health status, behavior risks, quality of life issues, access, and utilization of

services. A total of 143 questions comprised the adult survey and 120 for children.

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"It's a major undertaking to manage a research project of this scale," said HARC Board President Glen Grayman, M.D., "However, the data is vitally important to preserving our future health and quality of life within the communities we serve. Many professionals understand in anecdotal terms how the explosive growth of this region has changed public health. This new data can help us better understand to what degree that change has occurred and, correspondingly, how to prepare for future needs."

Because of the large sample size, researchers will be able to deliver statistically valid results in virtually every major survey category. This is in stark contrast to prior needs assessment initiatives with low sample sizes and an emphasis on qualitative, versus quantitative data.

This winter's release of the HARC *Community Health Monitor* will take place at a public event aimed at civic leaders and professionals across the community health spectrum. More information can be obtained by calling HARC at (760)601-3663.
