Survey Background



- Organizations in the Coachella Valley were frustrated by the lack of solid, reliable data to describe the health status and health needs in the region, and thus, HARC was formed.
- It was determined that HARC should assess the health of the Coachella Valley by conducting a survey (first survey launched in 2007).

- Guided by a steering committee of 30+ local organization and with help from experts, HARC determined that the survey would be...
 - Random digit-dial telephone survey
 - Every three years
 - In English and Spanish
 - Including adults and children
 - Sample size about 2,500 people

Survey Content



Data Dissemination

HARC collects, cleans, weights, and analyzes the data before reporting it out. The data is reported out in a wide variety of formats, including:

- Executive Report (available online and in print)
- HARCsearch (online query-based tool)
- Special Reports (funded separately, focusing on health disparities in topics of interest such as veterans, seniors, young children, etc.)
- Media (TV, radio, social media)

Spotlight on Nonprofit Fundraising

In the past decade, Coachella Valley nonprofit have brought in more than \$15 million in funding by using HARC's data to demonstrate their need and support their requests.

- Mental health counseling for children
- Transportation for people with disabilities
- ... and more!


Publicizing Data Collection

- Paid advertising
- Partner agencies promoting (thank you!)
- Door-to-door outreach in primarily Latinx neighborhoods by our partner, Communities for a New California (CNC).
 - 8 weekends of outreach
 - Spoke to 2,790 residents
 - Left door hangers at another 3,353 homes





- Research Lab (SRL) made over 500,000 phone calls.
- \$100 Visa gift card randomly awarded each week
- •Increased percent of completed surveys on cell phones:


- **341,500+** adults
- Race:
 - 66% White/Caucasian
 - 3% Black/African American
 - 1% Asian
 - 3% American Indian
 - **27%** other
- Ethnicity:
 - 52% Hispanic/Latino
 - 48% non-Hispanic/Latino

- 25% of adults live in households that fall at or below the federal poverty line.
- •51% of adults live in households with an annual income below \$50,000.



Health Insurance Coverage, 18 to 64




Health Insurance Coverage, 18 to 64




Health Insurance Coverage, 18 to 64





Usual Source of Care (18+)







HIV Testing

51% of local adults have been tested for HIV at least once.

The other 49% have <u>never</u> been tested and thus do not know their status.





High blood pressure	35.7%	121,517

Arthritis	28.8%	97,762

- 22% of local adults are limited in some way in their daily activities because of a physical, mental, or emotional problem
- •11% of local adults are deaf or hard of hearing
- 9% are blind or low vision





- •29% of Coachella Valley adults have been diagnosed with one or more mental health disorders.
- •The top three most common mental health disorders are:
 - Depressive disorders: 14%
 - Anxiety disorders: 12%
 - PTSD: 9%








Behavioral Health

- •32% of Coachella Valley adults have had an emotional, mental, or behavioral problem in the past year that concerned them.
- •13% of adults with mental health concerns and/or diagnoses needed mental health care in the past year and couldn't get it.




Loneliness

"How often do you feel lonely or isolated from those around you?"






- •66% of Coachella Valley adults have a BMI that puts them in the "overweight" or "obese" category.
- •Of these adults, about 39% believe they are "about the right weight".





Safe Place for Outdoor Recreation

"Do you feel that you have a safe place to walk, bike, and/or hike in your neighborhood?"







- •21% of local adults have spent less money on food because they had to prioritize other basic needs.
- 16% of local adults worried their food would run out before they got money to buy more.
- 10% of Coachella Valley adults had to cut the size of meals or skip meals due to a lack of money.
- •4% of local adults had to go for a whole day without eating.



Children



- ■88,350+ children
- Race:
 - 67% White/Caucasian
 - 3% Black/African American
 - 2% Asian
 - 4% American Indian
 - **25%** other
- Ethnicity
 - 52% Hispanic/Latino
 - 48% not Hispanic/Latino

- 29% of local children live below the poverty line.
- •44% live in households with an annual household income of less than \$50,000 a year.

Adverse Childhood Events (ACEs)

Types of adverse childhood experiences:


- Abuse (emotional, physical, sexual)
- Neglect (emotional or physical)
- Household instability (witnessing domestic violence, substance abuse in household, mental illness in household, parental separation/divorce, incarcerated household member)

This survey asked four ACEs questions in the household instability section.

41% of Coachella Valley children have experienced at least one of these four ACEs.


Access and Utilization

- The majority of children have some type of health insurance; however 5% are uninsured.
- ■81% of local children have had a routine check-up in the past year.
- Usual source of care:
 - 35% doctor's office
 - 34% urgent care
 - 12% clinic
- 83% of children have visited a dentist at least once



Water Safety








- •25% of children age 3+ have difficulties with emotions, concentration, behavior, and/or getting along with other people.
- 18% of Coachella Valley children 3+ have been diagnosed with one or more mental health disorders.
- The top three most common mental health disorders are:
 - **ADD/ADHD:** 7%
 - Anxiety disorder: 6%
 - Developmental delay: 5%

Sleep

5% of children are sleep deprived in Coachella Valley


SLEEP DURATION RECOMMENDATIONS

- •46% of children 2+ have a BMIfor-age percentile that puts them in the "overweight" or "obese" category.
- About 64% of parents/guardians of these overweight/obese children believe their child is "about the right weight".







- 17% of parents/guardians of local children worried whether the food would run out before they got money to buy more.
- 14% of local children live in households that had to spend less money on food because they needed to prioritize other basic needs.
- •4% of Coachella Valley children had to cut the size of meals or skip meals due to lack of money.



Conversations with Children 6 to 17

5 MOST COMMONLY DISCUSSED

Smoking, vaping, etc.: 71%

Drugs: 70%

• Racism: 66%

Alcohol: 62%

Social media, sharing of private pictures: 61%

5 LEAST COMMONLY DISCUSSED

Self-injury (e.g., cutting): 22%

Eating disorders: 25%

Domestic violence: 31%

Suicide: 34%

Depression or isolation: 41%
